Summertown Montessori Nursery

Setting: Summertown Montessori Nursery is situated in a bright, spacious and modernized stone-built building just off Banbury Road in Summertown, North Oxford. The nursery premises occupy the entire lower floor, comprising a large open-plan hall, a kitchen, toilets, a cloakroom, an office and a securely fenced garden. Access is via Banbury/Portland Road with off-street parking available in the hall car park. SMN is registered with OFSTED for up to 30 children, between 1 and 5 years of age. The small informal nature of the setting is conducive to both strong staff-parent interaction and to a personalized educational plan for each child. We use the Key Person approach, meaning each child will have a dedicated member of staff for their well-being. The nursery serves a mixed-income, multi-cultural and international community.

Staff: The nursery is directed by a senior childcare and Montessori professional with over 26 years' experience. The running of the day is carried out by an on-site supervisor/manager, with the other staff comprising of a Montessori teacher and early years practitioners qualified to NVQ Level 2/3. Additionally, the nursery may have trainees or work-place students assisting at any given time. Each full-time staff member has a career development plan and is committed to further training.

Ethos: Every parent wants the best for their child. It is now widely accepted that a child's pre-school years can be critical for later growth, seeding and cultivating aspirations to realize their potential. At SMN, we will assist each child's emotional, physical, social and intellectual development by stimulating the child's natural thirst for knowledge and the desire to explore his or her natural environment. Our overall aim is to provide your child with the "right" conditions to encourage their individual talents to blossom to the full. We aim to achieve this through thoughtful and sensitive observation of each child which is then used to inform subsequent planning for that child. Our desire is that the experience gained in the colourful, culturally-diverse environment of Summertown Montessori gives a firm foundation for further education and, moreover, for life.

Our Approach: In accordance with the Montessori approach of a carefully planned environment, the "teacher" will direct the child towards activities that will fulfill his or her needs. The children will be free to choose their own activities and each experience is presented individually to the child. Within small groups, each child will be helped individually to fully use and understand specifically designed equipment which develops the senses, aids the teaching of reading, writing and mathematics and introduces art, geography, nature studies and the concept of time. The curriculum also includes music and movement, French, local nature and interest visits, familiarization with computers and, throughout, an awareness of different cultures and their traditions.

What is Montessori?

Origin

The Montessori approach to education of the child is based on the principles developed in the early 1900's by an Italian educationalist, Dr Maria Montessori. Dr Montessori has since become recognized as an outstanding pioneer in early-years education and her ideas have not been incorporated into mainstream education but also into modern management and high-tech entrepreneurship.

Definition

Quite simply, the Montessori approach unleashes a child's natural curiosity in a controlled manner and directs it in a purposeful way.

The main tenets underpinning the Montessori philosophy are:

- A child up to 6 years of age has an enormous capacity to acquire knowledge, due to the so-called "absorbent mind".
 - A child will be very disposed to acquiring knowledge, i.e. learning, through careful stimulation and the fostering of self-respect and respect for others.
 - The environment is carefully designed to provide the necessary stimuli.
- The net result is that the child is self-motivated, learning through their own actions, at their own pace and on their own terms, comfortable in questioning in their acquisition of knowledge.

Environment & Teacher

Montessori nurseries differentiate themselves by the classroom environment. The furniture, teaching materials, learning tools and the ambience are designed to create an environment where the child is at ease, learning is both fascinating and joyful, stimulating further discovery and the exercise of decision-making, growing in confidence and independence.

The role of the "teacher" is critical too. Through careful observation of each child, the "teacher" directs that child towards activities that fulfil that child's needs, i.e. is specific to that child. The observational acuity of the Montessori "teacher" known as a Directress is highly developed.

Beyond ...

The Montessori approach is not simply concerned with intellectual rigour but seeks to create a "well-rounded" individual. The Montessori approach is a universal one, equally suitable for the gifted and the challenged, and thrives in an international or multi-cultural setting. The overall goal is to foster a confident, happy child, instilled with an enthusiasm for learning and armed with a healthy respect for others. Not surprisingly, Montessori alumni are over-represented in Silicon Valley and in the

Nursery Grant and OFSTED

The UK Government offers a grant for all 3 and 4 year olds, as well as funding for some 2 year olds equivalent to 570 hours of free childcare. There is an additional grant equivalent to a further 570 hours funding for 3 & 4 year olds, subject to means testing (see our Fees webpage for details). Every few years, our nursery is audited by the Office of Standards in Education (OFSTED) as a requirement for obtaining the grants. We strive to achieve a balance between Montessori teaching practice and the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) as defined by the Department for Education (DfE).

Learning and Development

The EYFS defines expectations in children's learning and development by the end of the reception year, i.e. at the end of a child's first year in formal education. There are seven specified areas of learning and development, all of which are inter-related and self-reinforcing. However of these, three areas are defined as crucial:

1. Communication and Language
2. Physical Development
3. Personal, social and emotional development

The remaining four specific areas which strengthen the three prime areas are:

4. Literacy
5. Mathematics
6. Understanding of the world
7. Expressive arts and design

The educational programmes that are in place must support all of these areas at SMN, each child will be assisted in making progress in each in accordance with their own rhythm and interest level. The enabling environment of the Montessori setting and the fostering of self-respect and positive relationships with those around the child provide the basis for obtaining the appropriate levels of skill, knowledge and experience in all 7 areas when they leave the nursery to start formal education.

Grant for Childcare

All 3 and 4 year-olds (and disadvantaged 2 year olds) are entitled to 15 hours per week of free early years education for 38 weeks of the year. This continues up to compulsory school age, i.e. the term following their fifth birthday. For advice on applying for the grant, please speak to the Nursery Manager.
